Robyn Campbell continues to do a wonderful job promoting early literacy through her "Let's Read" read aloud reading sessions at Rasmussen State School. Robyn, a valued volunteer, holds sessions once a fortnight during school terms. Many of the families who attend, drop their older child/ren off at school, before heading to the school library where the sessions are held. Following is a quote from Robyn regarding the most recent session, the final one for term 3: "The whole session was delightful today. Everyone (even the two youngest) was wholly engaged in the story reading, songs &

activities. With one family in particular, who have attended on a regular basis, there appears to have been such a growth in the relationship between mother & son. I still remember the first session when both mother & child (who was essentially uncooperative) seemed very anxious. Contrasting this situation with what was evident today was wonderful. Their interactions with each other as they engaged in the various activities were really rewarding to see."

Brimbank recently delivered *Let's Read* to an African womens' group based in a school. The mothers bring their children and they learn English.

The Community Development Worker and a volunteer did some bookmaking with the group. The group they were working with had a little exposure to childrens' books but wanted to learn how to encourage their children to enjoy them. Most of them were not comfortable writing in any language.

They developed a simple story line e a c h participant produced a small book based on the same story line. The basic structure gave them a chance to practice English and by the end all participants could practice reading their own book. They really enjoyed the experience and felt it was something they could encourage their children to do.

Over the four weeks they talked about early brain development, the importance of sharing a book from an early age and things they could do with their children when sharing a book.

They also did story times with the children and practiced sharing books. At the end of the four weeks all participants received a *Let's Read* Pack and some second-hand books from the Library.





