....Encouraging Positive Experiences with Books Let's Read at Harmony Play Group, Brimbank - VIC

After consultation with the facilitator and taking into consideration recommendations from the *Let's Read* Translation Project it was decided to undertake a series of sessions to encourage positive experiences with books. Each session would encourage and teach skills in sharing books with children 0-5 years old.

Over the last six weeks the Learning

for Life Worker at Brimbank has been

rolling out Let's Read with the

Harmony Playgroup. The group is

mainly made up of Burmese

participants who have little or no

English. Participants in the group did not view books as fun and did not feel

they had the skills to share books with

their children.

Over the last five weeks the group has been making books. This allowed them to use collage and involved their children in making a shared story. It gave the worker time to get to know the group and gain trust. The books created were simple and were either picture books or books in their own language. The group enjoyed this so much that they decided to make a Burmese Noodle Cookbook. This book was completed and launched at the group with a celebration lunch of Burmese Noodles.

Reading was modelled to the group using the Noodle Cook Book that they had developed. As the book was read the worker demonstrated the technique of pointing to the words, following text from left to right and questioning.

After this the *Lets Read* Book 'Wheels on the Bus' was used to demonstrate reading a children's book. The worker did not read the book but told a story by using the pictures as the book was in English. The worker demonstrated how to tell the story using actions, noises and asking questions etc. A mother from the group who has received *Let's Read* Training and the facilitator joined in to encourage the group to participate.



The launch was held at the Parks Community Centre and officially launched by the Hon Jay Weatherill MP (Minister for Education and Early Childhood Development). This was a very successful and fun event with lots of games and activities available for the children, including face-painting, a clown making balloon animals, a children's circus teaching magic tricks, play-dough activities and craft.

Literacy Links Project - WA

The Literacy Links Project is a Children Community for (C4C)Mirrabooka initiative, delivered by Ngala (Community Partner). At the heart of the Literacy Links Project is Let's Read. Ngala has actively promoted Let's Read through local service providers including the Early Learning Centre, Special Education Unit and Family Day Care. Ngala has also partnered with community projects such as the Parks Project Community and Multicultural playgroup, to deliver Let's Read to local families in the C4C Mirrabooka area.

An active recruitment process was recently undertaken to extend the delivery points for *Let's Read* in the local community. An Inspiring Reading Session Story Rasmussen State School – QLD

In Queensland, the Reading to Children *Let's Read* communities have an additional element to the program, whereby volunteers read to children aged 0-5, in various locations throughout the community. As part of this, Robyn Campbell conducts a regular storytime session in the library at Rasmussen school in Townsville. Sessions are held at 8:30am on Wednesdays and most of the parents / caregivers, who attend with their young children, do so after 'dropping off' an older sibling/s at the school.

This is Robyn's account of part of a recent session: "Undoubtedly the special highlight of today's session occurred during our singing of 'Brown Bear'. We began our singing focussing initially on the babies, (although everyone joined in). In keeping with the theme of today's book, we sang 'Brown bear', using

actions also. I modelled the actions with my teddy bear (my 21 year old daughter being *just* a little too old for this!!!) to guide the parents.

During the singing, one of the mothers spontaneously burst into tears in response to her baby's engagement and absolute joy in the activity. She excitedly exclaimed her amazement at her baby's focussing on the picture and giggling during the singing. She thought that she needed to be apologetic to the group for her emotions, but was reassured by everyone that her response was totally natural and that shared experiences such as these provided further opportunity to strengthen the bond between caregiver and child. Most of the other mothers wiped away their tears in seeing her pure joyousness.
