Parents & Children Enjoying Story Time

The *Let's Read* Program was launched in Roebourne on Tuesday May 17th at the WA Pilbara community Roebourne, which has an Aboriginal population of about 90%. The launch was a great success with many of the local children and families enjoying the activities of making their own interactive books, as well as hearing stories, learning about the *Let's Read* initiative and then eating kangaroo stew and damper.

The Smith Family Learning for Life Team Leader, Daphne Trevurza said the program was a "unique opportunity for the community...to make an investment in their children's future. Our children will have the chance to be part of a new generation who are better placed to learn to read when they reach school".

Elders in the community who attended the *Let's Read* training said that this was new for many families that they need to start reading to children before school and it will take more than one discussion for this message to be ingrained in the community. But one of the elders said, "this is a great program for our kids, and will hopefully help to keep our kids in school".

Let's Read is now being delivered in Rosebud West and Tootgarook through a co-ordinated community partnership. The community partners include Family Day Carers, Child Care professionals, kindergarten teachers, family support workers, Enhanced Maternal and Child Health and community volunteers who have undertaken training.

Let's Read is being incorporated into the suite of programs provided to families seeking support and interventions. A facilitator commented that it was nice to have something enjoyable to offer a family at

the end of a session that can support them in being more involved with their children. The Rosebud West Community Initiatives Steering Group welcomes the ongoing support and involvement of the Murdoch Children's Research Institute's Centre for Community Child Health and in particular the *Let's Read* Project Officer, Erica Gardner, in guiding and supporting the next phase of *Let's Read* in their community.

Finding new ways to repeat the message of Let's Read... and

Let's Read Brimbank - VIC

The Let's Read program has been in the Brimbank community since 2009, and they are finding new ways to repeat the messages of "Let's Read" and re-energise the delivery.

Recently the local coordinator of *Lets Read* has reinvigorated one of the steering group partners, Brimbank Libraries, by developing new ways to implement *Let's Read* activities into existing library programs. The first activity was a special "*Let's Read*" story time. Clowns developed a musical skit where "*Let's Read*" books were incorporated into their performance, tip sheets and books
