

On a visit to the Girrawheen Food Bank, I was approached by a Somali mother who remembered me from my previous visit when I had delivered *Let's Read* packages. She revealed that the 3 books she had received on this visit were the first books her children and the entire family, had ever owned. The same was true for her neighbour who had also received the *Let's Read* packs for her two children.

The mother disclosed that since then both women save \$3 out of their fortnight Centerlink payments and use the money to buy children's books once every month, which they swap and share. In this way they have started their own 'library'.

# Baby Bag Program Success in Dubbo, NSW (thanks to Let's Read)

Macquarie Regional Library in Dubbo has been successfully delivering a Baby Bag program to all new parents in Dubbo for over 4 years. The program was funded through the Communities for Children initiative supported by the Australian Federal Government. The Baby Bag program is an outcome of a number of organizations working together to improve literacy for many, especially Indigenous families. The Baby Bags are coordinated by the library service and delivered by the Child and Family Health Nurses on their first home visit. The library develops the baby bags with the wonderful resources made available by *Let's Read* and provides training to the Child and Family Health Nurses, so they can deliver the message of the importance of early literacy in a baby's life.

Evaluation forms are included in the bags, and if parents return the form, they receive another free book from the *Let's Read* range. Some of the comments from parents:

To expand on the great success of the *Let's Read* program in Collie, the Collie "Read with Me" group in partnership with The Smith Family and Collie Library, held a community book reading session for children and parents from Koolbardi Kindergarten at the Collie Aboriginal Baarnimarr Park.

The event was well received with 12 students and 11 parents attending. Koolbardi teacher Mrs Janet Gemignani read the "Caterpillar and Butterfly" book which captivated the children with the use of the Lava and Caterpillar puppets. After the book reading session, the Koolbardi students had a tour of the park followed by morning tea at the Collie Library.

Once morning tea was finished, local Noongar Kristina Ugle read her book that she wrote in Noongar language "Naatj Noonook Djinanj" ("What did you see"). They also learnt from Kristina Ugle that "Baarimarr" means

'Happy' in Noongar and that was the traditional name of her Grandfather.

The Collie Library also spoke to parents about the Better Beginnings program which reiterates the message from *Let's Read* that children need reading as a quality activity time spent with their family. The book pack included an alphabet book so that parents can share letter sounds with their children, as hearing the sounds of letters is an important beginning to learning to read for 4-5 year old children. The families who attended received this beautiful book pack on the day to take home to read to their children. Families also were invited to join the local library, with two new families joining on the day.

**New Volunteer Support**: Brimbank now has a new volunteer, Maria Washer who has taken charge of the book ordering and checking of orders. She will be organising a working bee to collate the 1200 *Lets Read* pack for the New Year. In early 2012 we will be distributing another 1200 *Let's Read* Bags at the 12 month old. Maternal Child Health Checks.

**First Mums Talks**: We have continued to add value to our delivery of *Let's Read* with short talks at Maternal Child Health first mums groups. These are an informal talk which introduces the concept of reading to children from 4 months onwards. As all people attending the groups are first mums it is an ideal opportunity to make contact. The talk is presented jointly with the maternal child health

nurse talking about the 'child's vision and neck muscle' to support the messages. Other key point discussed include what babies respond to at this age and what books to look for at the book shop or library. We also promote the baby bounce sessions at the library. First mums are given 4 month and 12 month book lists and tip sheets. Work was undertaken with the Filipino and Young mums group over term 3 this year and we undertook a cooking session.
